Gospel: Matthew 16:21-28

The holy gospel according to Matthew. Glory to you, O Lord.

²¹From that time on, [after Peter confessed that Jesus was the Messiah,] Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. ²²And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, "God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you." ²³But he turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

²⁴Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ²⁵For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. ²⁶For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life?

²⁷"For the Son of Man is to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay everyone for what has been done. ²⁸Truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom."

Sermon

Grace and peace, cross-bearers of the faith.

Over the years we've heard many times: "this is the cross I have to bear." What did Jesus mean when he encouraged us to take up our cross? Jesus told his friends he was going to Jerusalem to suffer and die. They probably didn't catch the part about being raised.

If someone dear to you told you that a week from Friday he was going to die, how would you react? Probably shocked. Wonder if he was going to take his own life. Talk him out of risky situations, suggest counseling, find someone to watch him until you were sure he wanted to keep living. That's how Peter reacted. "God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you." In other words: What are you talking about? We just figured out you ARE the Messiah. Messiahs don't DIE! They ride in and rescue people, kick invaders out, and rule in glory! What do you mean, you're going to Jerusalem to DIE? We won't allow that to happen!

That's why Jesus tells Peter, "Get away from me! You're tempting me to ignore my mission. If I listen to you, I won't do what God wants me to do. Go away!"

But in Peter's mind, a savior couldn't die—there was too much to do. There were lives to save, the dead to raise, lands to free, food to share, mercy to offer and so much more! How could all that happen if Jesus wasn't right there with them each and every day? But Jesus knew that dying and rising again could be better than our ideas of what life should be like.

Our vision may be too narrow, too. Peter couldn't imagine what Jesus planned to do. Life taught him to be cautious, to plan carefully for tomorrow because what could happen might throw your plans way off. Peter's plan included a living Jesus, not a dead one. How could Jesus' death be good for anyone? Then Jesus says that Peter must take up his cross and follow him. Peter didn't want to hear that. Jesus tells Peter— and us— to take up our cross and follow him.

What is this cross Jesus asks us to carry? It isn't a chronic disease or fatal illness. Not the death of a loved one. Not an abusive relationship. Not living through a natural disaster. Not addiction or depression, not homelessness or hunger. They are not the cross Jesus calls us to bear.

The Apostle Paul tells us about the cross we are to bear. Turn to today's reading from Romans and follow along—this is the cross we must bear. [read Romans 12:9-21]

Can you bear that cross? I can't. That cross is too much for any of us to carry in this life. No way I can do all those good things and avoid the bad. I'll try, but I'll fail, I just know it.

Taking up our cross means doing the will of God, even if it's painful, even if it goes against what we would prefer. It means trusting that God's plan is better than our own plan- even if we think God's plan seems risky, even if we don't completely understand it.

I've carried my cross... when I've forgiven others when they haven't forgiven me; when I put the needs of others before my comfort; when I follow God's lead even when it will be hard.

Jesus accepted his cross to save us and all creation. The cross of Jesus blesses others, but it meant he would suffer to accomplish God's plan. Jesus has done the life-giving part by dying and rising FOR US. We can never be good enough to deserve that, but Jesus did it for us anyway. That's what we mean by "the grace of God." Even though we fail, Jesus still chose to die for us.

Now God's plan for continuing the work of Jesus rests with us. In gratitude for the priceless gift of eternal life, we can offer our lives to continue Christ's ministry— to love all, hate evil, serve the Lord; to not give up in hard times, to pray, to share generously, to return good for evil; to trust God and treat others with understanding.

We can't do this alone. But the Holy Spirit walks with each of us every day, giving us the strength to do that. The Spirit reminds us of the ultimate goal we all have—trusting the Lord and living eternally in his presence with all the saints.

Know that you are not alone in bearing your cross. Christ goes with you, and we stand with each other. Amen
